# Narrative Essay Rubric

#### Introduction Section Score: \_\_\_ / 8

- 1. Grabs attention with a hook
- 2. Clearly defines/establishes the focus and context for the essay
- 3. Provides a clear topic/main idea for the essay and forecasts a lesson learned or point which will be demonstrated through the narrative story (creates a sense of foreshadowing)
- 4. Provides an interesting and appropriate opening for the subject matter and intended audience
- 5. Establishes overall tone and mood for the narrative

# Organization/Structure Section Score: \_\_\_ / 15

- 1. Contains a distinct introductory paragraph, required number of body paragraphs, and a distinct concluding paragraph
- 2. Body paragraphs break at logical places
- 3. Transitions are used appropriately to connect sentences and paragraphs and establish overall flow
- 4. All paragraphs are unified around the primary idea of the narrative (coherence)
- 5. Narrative story progresses logically and sequentially

- 1. Appropriately and logically wraps up the discussion
- 2. Restates the main idea (in different words)
